
Co-Chairs Update



Corrective Action Plan (CAP) Update



Corrective Action Plan

The County and Metro have worked collaboratively to create the Corrective Action Plan (CAP). The CAP is an operational tool utilized to improve SHS operations. Metro and the County have reached agreement on the CAP content and it is in the process of being finalized.

Corrective Action Plan (CAP) will require:

- Monthly Financial Reporting (CAP Priorities and FY 24 SHS budgeted funds)
 - Quarterly at 75% CAP funds spent

Corrective Action Plan (CAP) will be completed when:

- 95% of funds spent in each CAP priority
 - 80% of Housing Multnomah Now Funds

- Behavioral Health Crisis Vouchers additional 25 individuals served

Provider & System Support

- Expanded Rose City Resource Guides printed additional 100k; distributed to 426 groups
- Permanent Supportive Housing building improvements 63 units; 2 properties


Special Session Review
