We work with community-based organizations and governmental entities to provide housing, street outreach, shelters, and other programs focused on people experiencing or at risk of homelessness in Portland and Multnomah County.

We also place particular emphasis on **coordinated services** that are participant-driven and equity-based.

## Homelessness in Multnomah County

5,860

people who accessed homeless services for the first time (FY23)

4,266

people moved to permanent housing from homelessness (FY23)

6,297

people experiencing homelessness on one night in January 2023

## Shelter: More Beds, More Options



In 2015, there were 650 beds at 8 sites, with most shelter beds concentrated in downtown Portland.



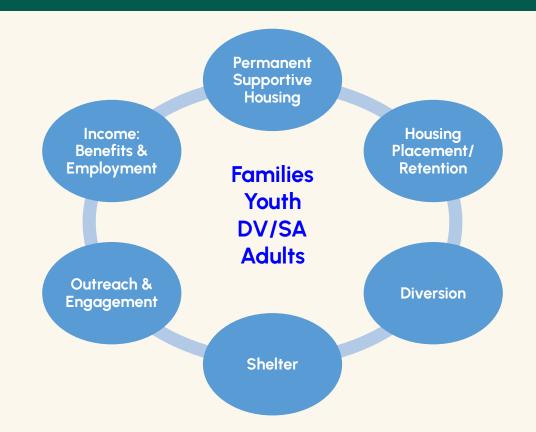
We now have funding for more than 2,400 adult shelter beds throughout the county, roughly 5x the capacity of 2015.

 Plus, space for hundreds more youths, families and domestic violence survivors

## Our Challenge

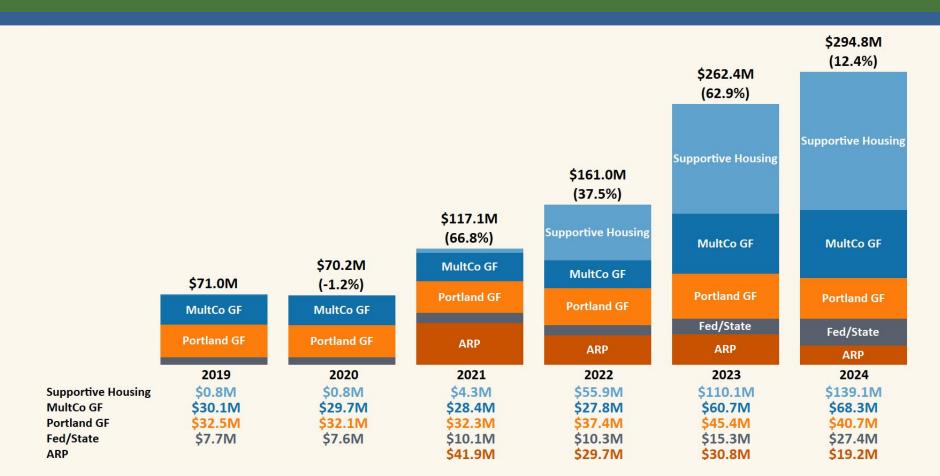
As we successfully move people out of homelessness and into permanent housing, the crisis in available affordable housing has led more people to fall into homelessness.



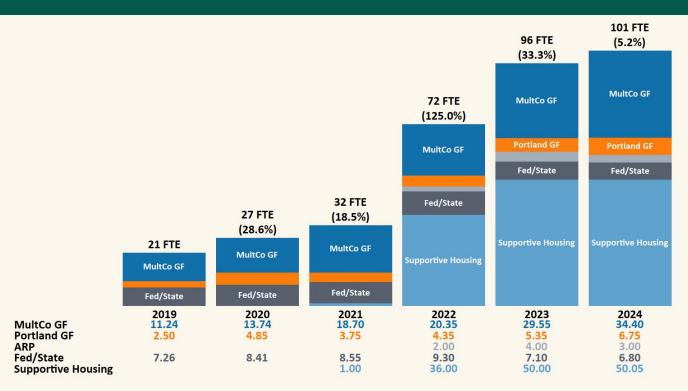

#### 6 YEAR TREND OF SIGNIFICANT JOHS FUNDING

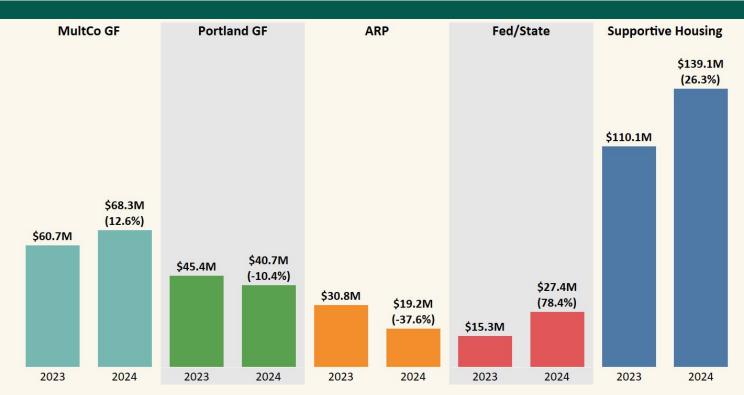


#### FTE - 6 Year Trend



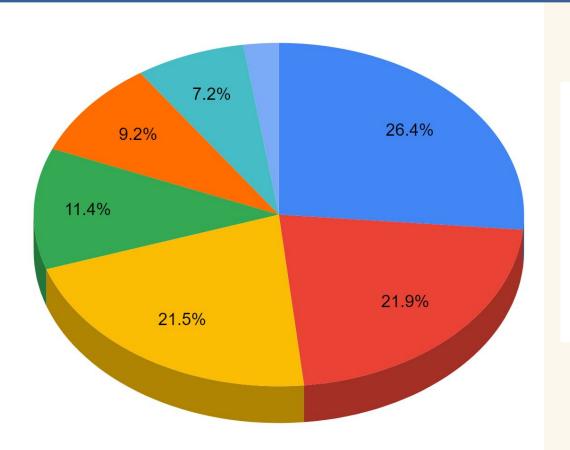

# Budget by Fund - \$294.8M



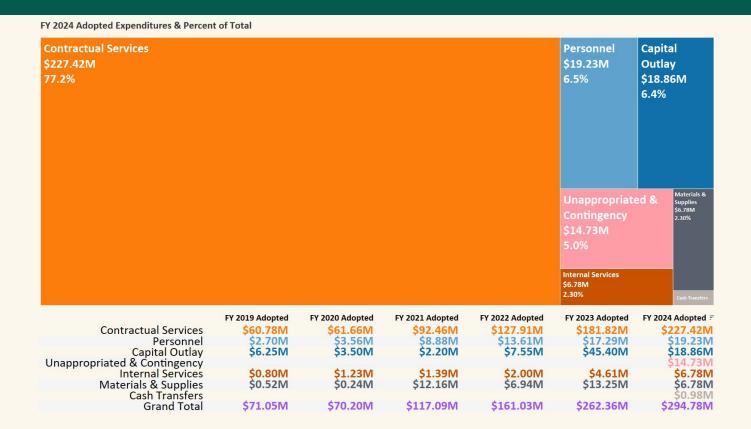
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#### FY24 JOHS BUDGET BY INVESTMENT AREA

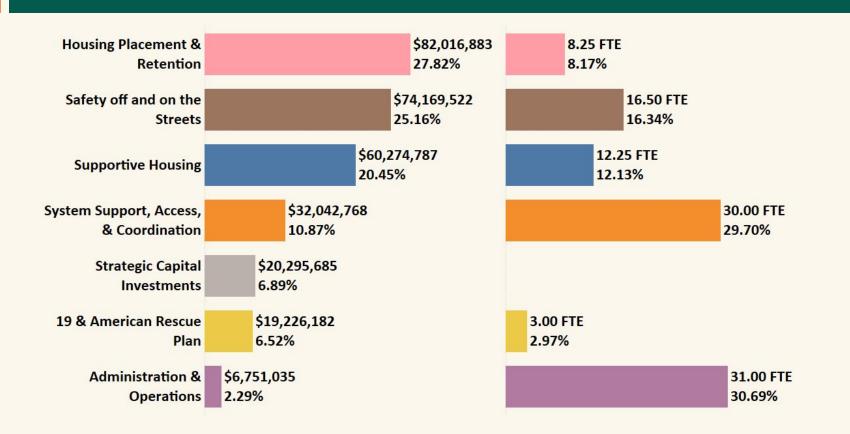

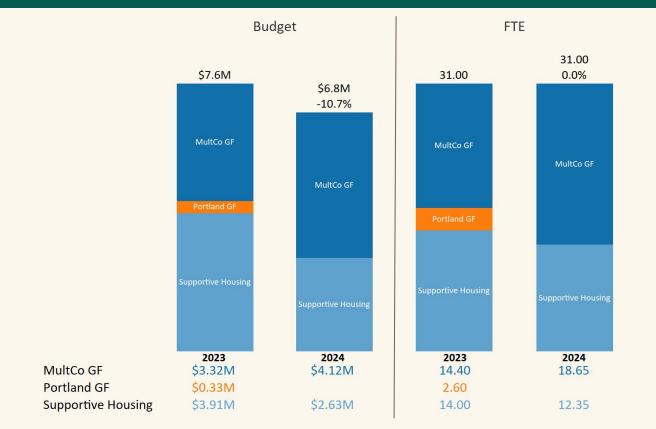

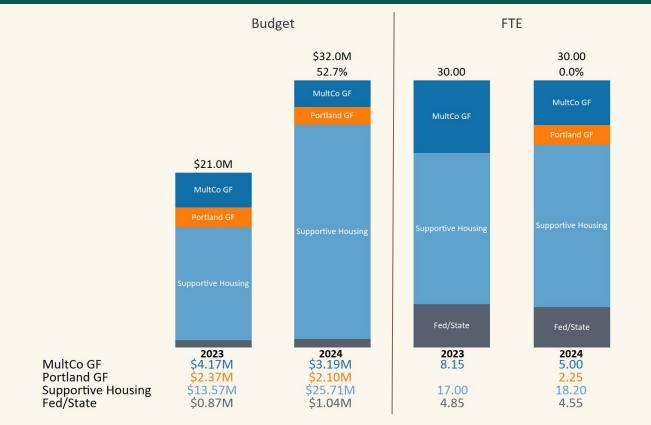
## Budget by Division (\$294.8M and 101.00 FTE)



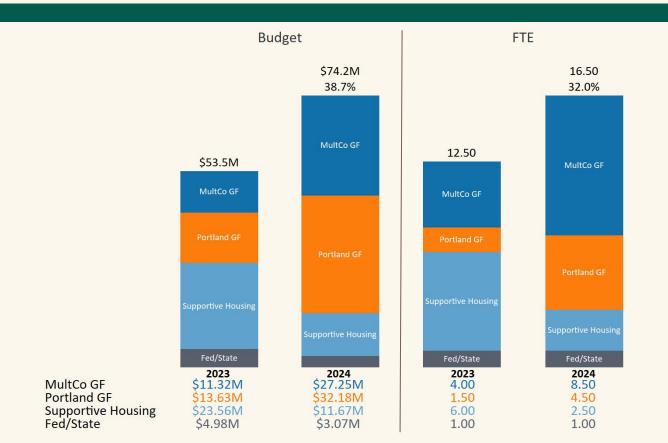

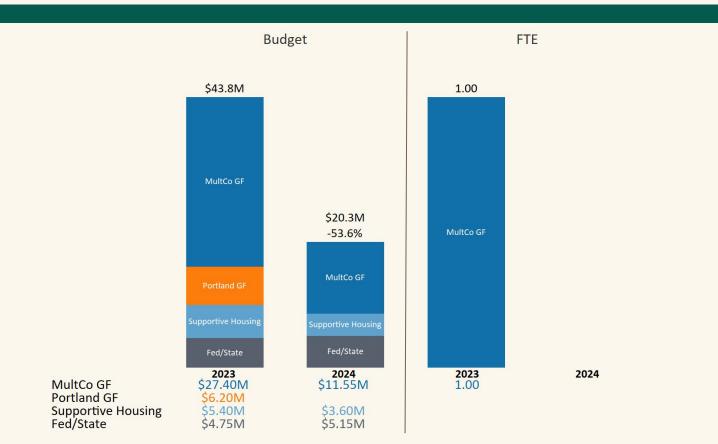

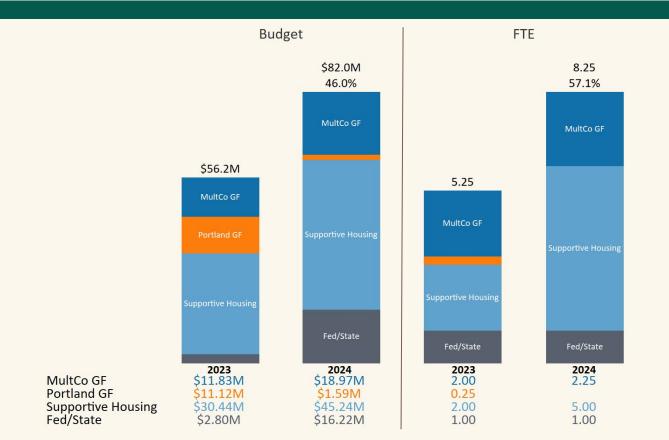

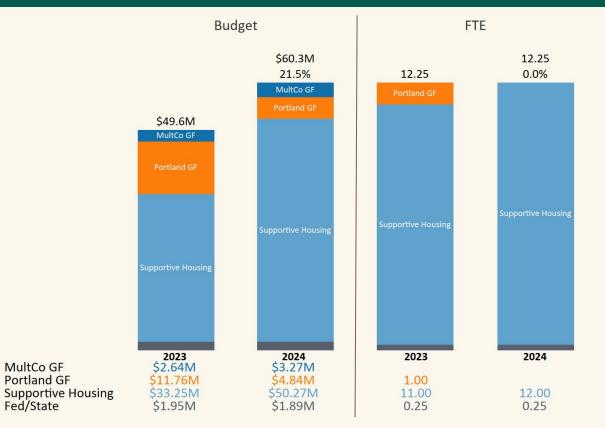

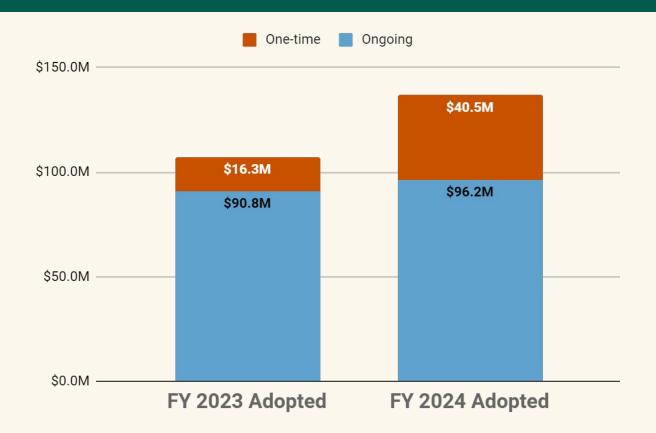

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## **County Budget Process**

#### Phase I

Department Budget Planning (Dec-Feb)

Departments prepare and submit budget requests.





#### Phase II

Chair's Proposed/Executive (Feb-Apr)

The Chair reviews department budgets and develops the Chair's Proposed budget



The Board of
Commissioners
approves the Chair's
Proposed budget.
(technical only)





#### **Phase IV**

#### Adopted Budget (Jun)

After deliberation, work sessions, and public hearings, the Board adopts the budget.

## County Budget Process (cont.)

**Note:** Departments have their own internal budget process within the larger countywide process.

#### November

Release the GF and SHS Forecast to determine how much funding is available

#### **February**

Departments submit a "submitted" budget to County Chair for consideration

#### May

Board deliberation, worksessions and Community Engagement



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#### December

Department budget **planning** 



#### **April**

Chair develops
Executive Budget
(Proposed) Board
Approves



#### June

Board amends and **Adopts** the FY2025 budget
