

Domestic & Sexual Violence Trainings for Housing and Shelter Providers

Summer and Fall 2024 Online Training Calendar

Overview: The JOHS DSV Team's is offering regular and ongoing training for housing providers in the Adult, Family and Youth Systems of Care to deepen skills for recognizing and responding to domestic and sexual violence.

Domestic and sexual violence is a primary cause of homelessness for women and children, and often creates significant barriers to obtaining and retaining housing. These workshops are designed for non-DSV housing and shelter providers to build skills for working with survivors who are accessing housing services.

Through the DV 101-103 series, attendees will learn about the dynamics of abuse, basic interventions for addressing abuse including safety planning, systems navigation and housing advocacy skills. Advanced and special topic workshops are intended to provide an in-depth understanding of compliance requirements for programs receiving funding through HUD's Continuum of Care programs. Additional dates and topics will be added at a later date.

Training Facilitator: Jaidra Hennessey - JOHS DSV Technical Assistance Program Specialist. Jaidra has worked at the intersection of homelessness and



domestic violence for two decades, developing a focus on housing protections and systems navigation with survivors.

Workshop Descriptions:

DV 101: Understanding & Responding to Abuse

Description: Develop foundational skills to recognize abusive relationship dynamics and respond in a trauma-informed, survivorcentered approach.

Intended Audience: This workshop was developed for housing providers who may encounter people experiencing abuse in their day to day work.

Learning objectives:

- Define different types of abuse
- Recognize power & control dynamics
- Avoid victim blaming behaviors
- Learn strategies for addressing concerns of abuse participants while prioritizing safety and confidentiality
- Practice skills around active listening, trauma-informed care, and person-centered services

DV 102: Supporting Survivors with Increasing Safety and Accessing Services

Description: Building on the concepts learned in DV 101, this workshop explores strategies for increasing safety and navigating survivor-focused resources in our community. Completion of DV 101 is highly recommended but not required.



Learning Objectives:

- Develop skills for creating safety plans
- Deepen knowledge of DSV System & Services
- Identify opportunities for co-advocacy with DSV system
- Understand legal options for survivors

DV 103: Survivor-Focused Housing Advocacy Skills

Description: Survivors of domestic and sexual violence are provided many housing protections at the state and federal levels. This workshop outlines these protections and how to use them as tools for reducing barriers and increasing access to permanent housing placement opportunities for survivors.

Intended Audience: This training opportunity is appropriate for and open to housing providers throughout the community.

Learning Objectives:

- Increase knowledge about housing protections for survivors of DSV, including VAWA, the Fair Housing Act, and Oregon Landlord Tenant law
- Develop strategies for assisting participants in overcoming barriers to housing related to abuse
- Assist survivors in understanding their rights
- Identify legal resources for survivors who have experienced discrimination related to their abuse



Sexual Assault 101

Description:Explore the dynamics of sexual violence, it's root causes and resources for supporting survivors of sexual violence.

Intended Audience: This workshop was developed for housing providers who may encounter people experiencing abuse in their day to day work.

Learning objectives:

- Define types of sexual abuse
- Examine the prevalence of sexual violence in society
- Explore barriers to safety for survivors of abuse
- Understand the rights of survivors
- Increase understanding of community resources

VAWA Implementation for Multnomah County CoC

Description: Training for Continuum of Care-funded programs on implementation of the Violence Against Women Act as required by HUD. Topics covered include VAWA Housing Rights, confidentiality, compliance and enforcement and VAWA Emergency Transfers.

Intended Audience: Housing Provider Agency Leadership and decision makers.

Learning Objectives:

 Develop understanding of the Violence Against Women Act's Housing Rights



- Deepen knowledge of VAWA's regulatory and statutory requirements for CoC Programs
- Strengthen understanding of VAWA documentation and when to use it.
- Understand the Multnomah County CoC Emergency Transfer Plan and how to implement it in your programming.
